A MESSAGE from Glenn

Thanks to our many supporters, volunteers, and agency partners, Tri-State Food Bank experienced another **record-breaking** year in 2021 distributing **over 17 million pounds of food** to those facing hunger along with the continued expansion of our programs. In 2021 we witnessed a gradual recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic; however, food insecurity rates still remained higher at the end of 2021 than before the pandemic started in 2020.

In 2021, Tri-State Food Bank launched a new initiative called the **Senior Grocery Program** supported by a grant from Feeding America. In the U.S., 5.3 million seniors face hunger. The Senior Grocery Program seeks to improve the health of low-income elderly populations by supplementing their diets with nutritious foods. We partner with Senior Centers and Area Agencies on Aging to provide monthly bags of food that include canned chicken and tuna, peanut butter, canned beans, oats, rice, pasta, soup, nonfat dry milk, fresh fruits and vegetables. In its first year the Senior Grocery Program distributed 5,984 bags and a total of 49,629 pounds.

Another major highlight of the year was the creation of a **fresh produce distribution hub** in southern Illinois. (See "Tri-State Food Bank Opens New Distribution Site" for details.)

Tragically, the year ended with one of the worst tornado disasters in U.S. history on December 10 & 11. In Tri-State Food Bank's service area, the tornado tore through Hopkins County, KY causing massive destruction especially in



the towns of Barnsley and Dawson Springs. TSFB partner agencies in Hopkins County including the Christian Food Bank of Hopkins, Covenant Care, Earlington Food Pantry, and Hope 2 All Community Food Bank in Nortonville, plus several other TSFB partners in neighboring counties immediately stepped in to provide food assistance and comfort to tornado survivors in the area.

We continue to work with our sister food bank Feeding America Kentucky's Heartland, the Kentucky VOAD, the American Red Cross, and Habitat for Humanity to ensure that tornado victims are cared for throughout the recovery and restoration process which will take several years. This is the world of food banking at its finest, and I am humbled and honored to be a part of this wonderful network.

On April 20, 2021, Tri-State Food Bank opened its first satellite distribution center in southern Illinois – a **3,600 square foot cold storage facility** located in Vienna (Johnson County) Illinois and in the heart of the "lower seven" southern Illinois counties where food insecurity rates are high and food access is low. The site receives weekly donations of fresh produce from a Walmart distribution center and the food is then distributed to TSFB partner agencies in Illinois.

During its first 8 months, Tri-State Food Bank distributed **219,275 pounds of fresh produce** to 22 partner agencies to help feed the hungry. The site was also used in a **Farm to Food Bank pilot project** supported by grants from Feeding American and the USDA in partnership with Feeding Illinois, Rendleman Orchards, and the St. Louis Area Food Bank. The Farm to Food Bank Program primary goal is to build a long lasting, sustainable, state-funded program that would create a relationship of farms working directly with food banks to increase food access, economic dollars within the state, profitability for Illinois farmers, community revitalization and reduce food waste. The pilot project was very successful.
